# A VERY SERIOUS COLLINS RADIO COLLECTOR AMONG US!



No doubt at all from the picture of the Collins S-Line and KWM-2A rigs and accessories above that we have a very serious Collins Radio collector in our midst! This picture was recently taken at the QTH of Terry / KC4DV. But these vacuum tube based radios are not just collectibles - they all work and are connected up so that Terry can use them on the air regularly without hassles. Terry accumulated these mostly out of nostalgia - as a native of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the Home of Collins Radio where they were manufactured, and because some about the same age as Terry. A major factor too was that, like many younger, very enthusiastic HF ham operators of the late 1950's through the mid-1970's, Terry quickly picked up from the old timers that Collins made the very best ham and military radios. But Collins gear was always way beyond the budgets of young hams; still Terry coveted a nice Collins set up ever since he was licensed as a Novice (WN0SPX) in 1976. That remained just a dream until he decided recently, now or never, and began in earnest to accumulate this impressive collection of the very best.

The S-line equipment on the top shelf above includes a 32S-1 transmitter, 75S-1 Receiver, 312-B4 station console and 30L-1 Amplifier, These were manufactured in 1959 and 1960. The S line on the desk is from the mid-1970s and consists of the rare 32S-3A transmitter, 73S-3C Receiver, 312-B4 Station Console and 30L-1 amp. On the far right side of the desk is a KWM-2A, 312B-4 console and with a 30L1 amp sitting above. The microphones are a SM2 and SM3 made by Turner Microphone for Collins.

Terry's Air National Guard Combat Communications Unit in California deployed with the KWM-2A as late as 1988. These radios are a lot of fun to operate and have superb audio. Be nice to Terry and he may invite you over to see this amazing collection and try them out on the air!

### Remembering Radio Shack

Last week Radio Shack filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection in Delaware; an excellent article briefly tracing the long history of Radio Shack and its impending demise appeared in BusinessWeek just before the bankruptcy filing. See, http://tinyurl.com/RS-SlowDemise Most (or all?) of the Radio Shack outlets in Northern Virginia have recently closed as money losing and no longer profitable to operate. RS stores have closed all over the country too. The financial press say that a cellphone company may take over many of the remaining stores and RS's product line will henceforth be limited to telephones and accessories. Very sad and unfortunate, especially for those of us who remember different times at RS, including the better days long ago. For those who want to remember the old days, got to http://radioshackcatalogs.com for an archive of old RS catalogs back to the 1950s.

One of the earliest Radio Shack stores (No. 4 or 5) was on High Ridge Road in Stamford, Connecticut, the next town from where I was growing up in the late 1950's. My brother, Fred / N3KVV, two years older than me, began working there part-time when he was 16 and attending a technical high school (electronics) in Stamford. That store was then owned by the Deutschmann brothers from Boston - before Tandy Corporation purchased the small chain in 1962 - indeed, the RS group was so small at that time that Fred remembers going on a company trip in the early 1960s to the RS headquarters store on Boston where he met the Deutschmann brothers and received a hand signed stock certificate for 10 shares of Radio Shack stock; Fred says he still has it. He continued to work there parttime until he joined the Air Force in 1966.

Fred was very interested and knowledgeable about stereo hifi systems (which were new items in 1960), and had an opportunity to develop excellent sales and technical skills working at RS; he could also regularly pick up installation work on the side from the customers. I was two years younger and remember an incident when Fred was about 17, he had sold a very expensive and elaborate stereo system to a Luddite family who wanted it badly, but would not purchase it unless Fred agreed to install it in their large residence in North Stamford. Fred recruited me to help him; we assembled drills, tools, wire, switches and other items and set off to do the work. After some two hours or so of work, we had installed wired speakers in several rooms and Fred had demonstrated to the owner how to operate the equipment, how to move and reconnect speakers, etc.; the new owner was extremely pleased with how well the system worked and was happy to pay Fred's \$50 charge; he complimented Fred on how well his son (me) had assisted. Fred didn't blink, said nothing, but took the \$50 cash, offering to come back again if there were any problems. My eyes bugged out as the minimum wage then was \$1.00 per hour - a learning event I still recall.

The High Ridge Road Radio Shack back then also carried a large ham radio inventory and was a gathering place for local hams; it had two ham store managers and actively promoted ham radio in the area, stocking and offering a wide range of ham equipment and accessories from National Radio, Hallicrafters, Hammarlund, Gonset, Eico, Drake, Vibroplex and others, it also carried and sold a very wide assortment of wire, antennas and electronic parts in the store and also by mail order at low cost. Arrow Electronics, which also carried some ham equipment, had an electronics parts store in nearby Norwalk, CT but it sold mainly to industrial customers at higher prices than Radio Shack.

When I moved to the Boston area for school in 1964, I visited the old headquarters Radio Shack store on Commonwealth Ave. near Boston University but was very disappointed; that large store was half empty, Tandy had taken over in 1962 and ham radio equipment and most electronic parts were on the way out, but gadgets of all type were in. By the time I moved to Washington in 1968, Radio Shacks had proliferated massively; there was one on Connecticut Ave. N.W. within walking distance of where I lived in D.C. for several years; and there was one on Arlington Boulevard in Falls Church very close to where I worked as an engineer for several years.

In the late 1970's RS was a leader in providing small personal computer systems. Around 1979 when RS came out with the TRS-80 Model II with a very good (but very loud) daisy wheel printer for heavy office use. I quickly brought a system; although expensive (around \$5K, Z80 based, no hard drive, only 8' floppy disks), it had an good word processor (actually a text editor) and ran Visi-Calc spreadsheets; its word processor alone immediately outperformed the much more expensive the IBM MagCard systems then in very common use in offices. Suprisingly, it also outperformed a brand new \$60K IBM word processing console system. I quickly added three more TRS-80 Model II systems and the IBM equipment was sold off to others who did not see the technology change which was coming. Those RS systems ran flawlessly, no breakdowns, for years, until replaced by DOS and Windows computers by 1990.

On my last trip to a local Radio Shack store last fall, the young saleslady cheerily asked if she could help. I responded I need a BNC connector, some diodes and a Nibbler; her answer: I don't know what those are and don't think we carry them. I said I knew where they were and quickly found them. But I knew Radio Shack was in real trouble. Too bad.
