

SOME POSSIBLY USEFUL INFORMATION / THOUGHTS

1. Although knowledge and proficiency with Morse Code also known as "CW" (which stands for "continuous wave" signalling) is no longer required for any ham license, historically in this hobby which is now more than 100 years old it was required for all ham licenses. CW is still widely used on the HF ham bands for routine QSOs as well as in contest type exchanges (e.g. during Field Day, etc.); CW is also regularly used in other specialized and sophisticated ham radio activities such as EME (earth-moon-earth or moon bounce) communications. Obtaining a knowledge of Morse Code will enable one to learn about and be exposed to diverse facets of the ham radio hobby which would not be otherwise accessible.

With some initial guidance and some persistent effort, perhaps about 15 minutes a day for a few weeks, it is possible for just about anyone to learn and develop a modest proficiency with Morse Code. Making that effort will not only open up a lot of new activities for a new ham operator on the HF bands, it will also enable the use of very simple, low cost, but very effective transmitting and receiving equipment which can easily be home constructed (home brewed) from basic electrical and electronic components by just about anyone.

Morse Code skill is, in fact, no more difficult for anyone to acquire and demands no more persistence to master initially than learning to "touch type" (i.e., without looking at the keys) on a keyboard at a modest rate of speed. Similar to increasing "touch typing" skill and proficiency, once one gets over the initial learning curve (difficulty) with Morse Code in converting dit and dah sound sequences to letters and symbol sequences in your brain, one's proficiency and speed will rapidly increase with practice and use.

Many of the old-timers in the OVH taught themselves Morse Code years ago by listening to CW courses on records played on record players and also by listening to ARRL code practice broadcasts on the HF ham bands. Today, such records are no longer available, but there are now plenty of equivalent taped and MP3 file CW learning courses available online or very modest cost. Additionally, there are now many computer programs and smartphone and tablet applications for CW learning. And, the ARRL still broadcasts code practice sessions almost every evening. The CW Operators Club [http://cwops.org], among others, has been running good tutoring and mentoring programs for CW learners online in recent years, but if you are really interested in learning CW or would like exploring what is needed to begin learn, it would probably be easier and more efficient for you to just ask one of the old-timers in OVH club.

- 2. As though there is not already plenty of information about ham radio online, CQ Magazine recently today to be a major US ham radio publisher after more than 70 years.
- 3. Terry / WA4NTI and others in the OVH report success and usefulness with the Mobile Radio modeling software for predicting / estimating actual point to point VHF/UHF radio paths over real terrain paths. That free (for ham radio use) software is available from its author at http://www.ve2dbe.com/english1.html and there are a number of other web sites such as http://radiomobile.pe1mew.nl which explain how to and provide tips about making effective use of the Mobile Radio software.


A Lot of Radio Operations (but no ham radio operating)

This past weekend, your editor flew a P210N airplane from Calgary, Alberta back to the USA (first stop in Montana for CBP inspection) and from there east back to Manassas. The weather and visibilities were unusually good almost all of the trip so the flight was flown at much lower altitudes (i.e., closer to the ground) than usual and many pictures were taken out the windows as various sights and landmarks passed by. Because it was required that aircraft and ATC radio watches be maintained almost continuously, there were lots of radio communications, but with only one ham on board, there was no time for ham radio ops to give out QSOs with some very "rare" counties. Of the airplane's comm/nav/sat/radar/radio related controls / displays, about 80% are visible in the picture to the right which was taken during flight in South Dakota.

A number of the pictures taken out the windows during the flight are on the following page: 1. looking northeast about 30 miles southeast of Great Falls, Montana, 2. passing by Devil's Tower National Monument in northeast Wyoming, 3. going by Mount Rushmore, South Dakota, 4. crossing the Missouri River, Nebraska into Iowa, 15 miles
