ARRL / OVH FIELD DAY — for beginners and newcomers

The first ARRL sponsored Field Day was held in 1933, and a Field Day ham radio event has been held every year since 1933 - except during World War II when amateur radio operations were suspended.

Field Day was originally conceived as an emergency radio operating test or preparedness event. As a result, many Field Day participants set up temporary stations (sometimes with multiple transmitters) powered by emergency generators in tents or other temporary locations with portable or temporary antennas. Other participants operate from their home stations. One of the main objects of the radio operating portion of Field Day is to contact as many other Field Day participants throughout the USA and Canada as possible during the Field Day operating period. In recent years, there have been approximately 30,000 ham participants in the USA and Canada each Field Day so there are many, many stations available to contact for short radio exchanges.

During an OVH Field Day event about ten years ago, an OVH operator contacted at least one station in each of the States of the USA. Quite an accomplishment! Normally, the OVH Field Day operation makes several hundred contacts with stations in 40 or more of the States and many of the Canadian provinces.

Many of the organized Field Day operations pre-register with the ARRL which maintains a web site which shows the station locations. See, http://www.arrl.org/field-day-locator where you can find W4OVH

Over time, Field Day has developed an elaborate set of rules and regulations. These are important [See, http://www.arrl.org/files/file/Field-Day/2018/2018-Field-Day-Packet-Complete-Rev-6-June-18.pdf] to some but are not particularly important for first-timers who are simply looking to have fun. The local organizers make sure that the rules are followed and often try to organize operations during Field Day to maximize "points" earned according to latest the Field Day rules.

The OVH usually selects a nearby Field Day venue such as the Nokesville Park off of Aden Road, Nokesville, VA. At the Nokesville Park, the OVH has again reserved the Pavilion there for its base of operations this year. The Pavilion is an excellent location which provides good cover in the case of rain. Some members camp overnight in tents on the nearby grounds.

The OVH Field Day is an excellent opportunity to operate radio, meet and talk with other hams in the club and enjoy plentiful food. All members, member family members, and other friends are invited to attend. Everyone has a good time. The OVH also puts on an educational program and provides activities for non-hams or others who don't want to operate radios. This year there will be a Fox Hunt - hunt for a hidden VHF transmitter beginning at about 6:00 pm on Saturday. Radio operators are always needed, especially over night. Some number of the more dedicated OVH members will be there from start to finish. Plan to attend Field Day at the Nokesville Park Pavilion even if just for an hour or a few hours!




