make a plan to get everything back on the air in time for the Virginia QSO Party which is fast coming up on the March 21-22 weekend. That contest is always a good opportunity to see how well you can reach various corners of Virginia on VHF, UHF and HF. One doesn't need a big HF antenna to operate on HF: NVIS propagation works well with a small HF antenna. While my antenna is too low for good takeoff angles on 80m, it has worked extremely well for the contest and I had little problem working most of the stations I could hear, even the mobiles.

If you do make contacts during the contest, be sure to list OVH as your Club on your Log. Last year we had 12 club members submit logs; that which was good enough to get the OVH into the 5th spot among the participating clubs. I plan on trying to run a little digital for this year. I know John / KG4NXT and Mark / WA4KFZ will be heading to their out-of-town, Virginia QTHs. Resident antenna master Gil / KM4OZH will be out running mobile again and giving a new Arduino attachment for his tuner a work-out. As someone who's recently gotten interested in digital projects using Arduino, I want to hear how that works out for Gil. Everyone who participates and submits a log gets a nice certificate, even with just one contact; and your submitted log will up the OVH's participation.

Of course, Spring means some activities for the club itself; our support of the Tri-It-Now Mini-Tris will continue into 2020 and will start again in April. These events start in the early morning on Sundays at the George Mason University - Manassas campus and are a fun event to support. If you're new and looking to give your radio a workout, keep an eye on the reflector; I'll be posting information as soon as I get it from the organizer Andy / KJ4MTP. VP's Corner


This week we're experiencing a few days of spring like weather and the ionosphere is teasing us with occasional HF openings into Europe and hopes for an increase in the sunspot number.

Speaking of HF, this spring marks another anniversary in radio history. In spring of 1956, Air Force General Curtis LeMay led a flight of several aircraft half way around the world while maintaining continuous HF SSB communications with several Strategic Air Command (SAC) ground stations. Why? As commander of SAC's newly minted nuclear bomber force, LeMay needed a way to guarantee continuous command and control of his forces.

Smaller fuselage designs of faster jet bombers meant smaller crews and no room for a Morse operator. AM's noise vulnerability and poor talk power weren't going to hack it. What to do?

SSB (single sideband) offers a big improvement in efficiency and talk power over AM, and had been in use on some transatlantic telephone circuits since the 1930s. But its equipment occupied entire racks and needed special care and feeding. As any ham can testify, it doesn't take many Hz of drift before Donald Duck comes out of the speaker. Could a compact and stable SSB radio be developed for mobile platforms?

Shortly after WWII, Collins Radio introduced a desktop size SSB station for hams. LeMay and his deputy, General Griswold, met with Art Collins to see if

this setup might be modified for an airborne demo. Collins responded by installing 75A4 receivers and matching transmitters in several SAC aircraft. A series of landmark demo flights spanning much of the globe soon followed, silencing the harshest of skeptics and leading the way to a new HF command and control system for SAC. So ...what did these three, LeMay, Griswold, and Collins, have in common besides being forward thinkers? Answer: They were all hams.

Fast forward to today where nearly all of the old HF links have been replaced by satcom. Its wider bandwidths and freedom from sunspot cycles were viewed as an improvement over HF. Recently, several potential adversaries have demonstrated potent anti satellite capability, leading DoD to revive HF as a backup. With most of their traditional HF operators long gone, where can our military turn to restart HF training? The answer? Hams of course (right).

The Virginia Defense Force (VDF) is an auxiliary of the Virginia National Guard. They assist the Guard with functions like traffic control and communications, and, should the Guard be federalized, remain available to provide public safety functions. VDF has several command center trailers with HF radios and has contacted us regarding operator training. Join us at our March meeting for a presentation by Major Jim Stanley of the Virginia Defense Force.

Join your fellow OVH members for the Virginia QSO party on 21-22 March. And remember, our March meeting has been moved from the usual Tuesday to Wednesday 18 March due to a scheduling conflict. Hope to see you there!

How Did Our New OVH President Get Into Ham Radio And Who Is He?

The seed of my ham radio journey started 32 years ago at the tender age of 5 when I flipped on a radio tuned to the shortwave bands and became mesmerized when I heard CHU Canada sending out Time Signals. I still remember that event very well. As time went on, I became more and more fascinated with radios and electronics generally, and I started down a path that saw me spending a lot of my youth tinkering with those devices. As a teenager, my interests expanded to computers and the Internet gave me additional things to tinker with. Fortunately, the amount of knowledge that I had at my fingertips via the Internet allowed me to improve my skills with electronics to the point I was able to repair electronic and electrical things rather than just taking them apart to examine the innards.

Eventually, my love of music combined with my electronics curiosity when I was given a somewhat highend piece of audio equipment that I figured out how to fix; and I spent my late teens and early 20's repairing and flipping, or just enjoying hi-fi gear while I expanded my musical tastes. Today, one of the reasons I like digital modes is I can mute the radio and make QSO's without having to turn my stereo music off so long as RF isn't getting into the stereo. But I didn't know any hams who could help me get started in ham radio and I wasn't exactly rolling in cash. So when I eventually picked up the real nice shortwave radio I always wanted, I promised myself I'd eventually do the ham radio thing "after I was older and had the money".

Just before I turned 21 I was fortunate to find a good use for my diverse talents: I started working at what I had no idea could turn in to a career: coin-op technician. That's what I write on my Income Tax Returns because "guy that fixes pinball machines, arcade video games, jukeboxes, and slot machines" won't fit in the tax return box. That work, in addition to exposing me to the world of digital logic circuitry, exposed me to some really "old" equipment such as vacuum tube based jukebox amps. I learned how to read ladder-logic schematics for electromechanical games. As time went on, I was getting older and making quite decent money as I continued to learn more and more. After a few years of listening to SSB chatter on my Sangean ATS-909 radio and now "being older and having the money", I started looking into how to get into ham radio, especially HF. But before I got too deeply into the process I heard what I thought was HF's death-knell; BPL. The way that faulty technology was pushed for a while, I felt it was going to be around for a long while and possibly kill off HF operation. So I put a Beatles LP on the turntable and spent the next 11 years continuing on with my Hi-Fi hobby.


After these several misstarts and delays, I finally got my initial ham license and dove into ham radio on a "hands on" basis in 2015. I hate to admit that I was initially attracted by the cheap Baofeng radios that had appeared and the elimination of the CW knowledge requirement; so let's blame it on the RTL-SDR dongle that rekindled my fascination with radio in a big way. Now that I was older and wiser and much more goal oriented than as a teen, I was able to understand what was going on: I started studying online on my own, began hanging around online ham radio communities, and a few months later I left a VE session hosted by the OVH with my General ticket. With more study and with a lot of participation under my belt, 16 months later, I moved up to Extra and in 2017 I was able to switch from my original callsign, KM4JOJ, to NQ4T. I've been very actively involved and have done a little of many things so far: bounced some FM through satellites, bounced phone off the ionosphere, done some amazing weak-signal digital stuff, and I've gotten into the DV Hotspots for the V/U digital modes. I also have to admit that my several trips out to the High Sierra of Northern California to do a real off-the-grid Field Days with my friends such as Neil / N5EIL, in June is, I think, one of the crazier accomplishments.

The short of all of this is that, despite being a relatively new ham, I continue to be very enthusiastic about all aspects of out fascinating and very broad ham radio hobby. I will try hard to use my enthusiasm to do a good job as your new OVH President. 73 Jay NQ4T

Some Possibly Interesting or Useful Information / Recollections / Musings


As this Newsletter goes to press, the COVID-19 pandemic has reached to our area at last and the schedules of many public events, schools, etc. are being cancelled or closed temporarily or indefinitely. Most recently (ham radio wise), the Winterfest hamfest is being postponed because NVCC Annadale is closing down its campus venue. The Dayton Hamvention is mid-May in Ohio is still on. I recall nothing like this before. I spent two weeks in China in the early 2000's shortly after the SARS virus epidemic had ended, and some of the locals I spoke to then made light of it although there had been many deaths. Fortunately, the odds for an individual here surviving the COVID-19 so far seem very good, with many, once infected with the virus, suffering no more than a cold or a mild influenza. But having good odds is no reason not to take precautions. We should all hope and pray that this will be over within the next few weeks or by June. My father's father died during the 1918 influenza epidemic during which millions died worldwide. The 1918 virus was particularly virulent - within a week of my grandfather's death, one of his brothers and two of his brother-in-laws, all healthy young men in their 20's, also died.

Many of you have noticed that ARRL has increased its online publications - this is good stuff for those of us who are thoroughly immersed in "ham radio". If you haven't yet, check out the ARRL web site [arrl.org] for more details - a new online magazine and a podcast.
