

PRESIDENT'S LETTER:

First, the OVH Hamfest held on Sunday, June 14th at the Prince William County Fairgrounds was a great success with well over 2000 in attendance! Not only was the first commercial building sold out, but the second building was filled to capacity too. The outdoor flea market was quite busy too and also had a few more vendors than last year; subjectively I thought there was a higher quality of stuff, less "junk" being traded in the flea markets this year than in past years. At one point during the day when Hamfest attendance was at its peak, the part of parking lot visible from the entrance gates was completely full, up to and over the hilltop in the distance! We haven't seen that for a number of years. Of course, the near perfect weather conditions during the Hamfest doubtlessly helped to get all of the attendees out. Several commercial vendors advised "next year I need more tables, it was very busy, great Hamfest, see you next year." Several verbally committed to come next year and asked that they reserve the same places.



Special thanks are due to the Hamfest co-chairmen, Chris / KI4POT and Bruce / AB8CI, who worked extremely hard for months on organization and preparation to keep all aspects of a complicated event like the Hamfest on track, laying the foundation for its ultimate success. Thanks are also due to everyone who participated with the Hamfest committee groups and tasks assigned, and, ultimately, in setup, operations and tear down. There was an enormous amount of "behind the scenes" efforts and many, many OVH members put in countless hours. Ham radio fest June 16—Popular hobby a vital voice link in emergencies

Forty years ago when my husband and I were stationed in Santiago, Chile, I gave birth to twin boys. There were no cell phones or e-mail, telephone connections were spotty, and letters were called snail mail for good reason. The most expedient way of getting the birth news to my anxious parents was through local ham radio operators.

A Santiago ham made contact with another ham in Chicago, and that stranger telephoned my parents in Connecticut with the good news, allowing me to talk with them from my hospital bed. "Two boys, mom, two! Over." Ever since, I have had a soft spot in my heart for ham radio operators.

So I was delighted to recently meet the Ole Virginia Hams, a thriving local ham operator group that meets in Manassas once a month. On June 16, at the Manassas Fairgrounds, the Ole Virginia Hams sponsored the "Ham Fest," a selling and buying spree for thousands of

ham radio operators.

Theresa Heartney, an avid group member, said, "It is a giant flea market, where both professionals and locals will buy, sell and trade equipment."

It is also a big social event and a licensing testing location, where aspiring ham operators, after studying ham radio manuals, can be tested for the Federal Communications Commission licenses. According to George Tarnovsky, president of the local group, eight people passed the test at a recent testing session at the Nokesville Volunteer Fire Department, and a ham radio will be added to the other emergency fire equipment.

With more than 100 members in the area, the Virginia ham radio group serves as a vital means of communication during emergencies both large and small. "Every time there is an emergency or weather situation, the infrastructure can go down, and local officers and emergency personnel count on hams to provide the equipment, personnel and technical skills to establish

communication," Tarnovsky said. Heartney recounted the time in 2004 when Hurricane Isabel caused emergency shelters to open all around the area. Ham operators went to the shelters and established communications between shelters to help coordinate the relief effort.

Ham operators also provide needed services in non-emergency

every night at 7:30, ham operators join together in a "Traffic Net," where people send messages to others in the net-on the cars with ham antennas poking up.

"People think of us as an older technology," Tarnovsky acknowledged. "But behind every technical advance are ham engineers." He pointed out the ham radio community has actually launched its own satellite, and now worldwide contacts can be made by bouncing signals off the satellite.

John Heartney recalled a recent vacation in Olympia National Park where he made contact through a satellite connection with a blind man in California.

The exchange of cards and call letters verify all ham contacts. Don Blasdel, a long-term member, has made contact with more than 350 countries. "I still have over 100 cards from contacts I made when I was in high school," he said. "The nice part is that I have been to many of the countries." Blasdel said, "My wife is a ham and my two sons are hams. It's a wonderful hobby."

Tarnovsky concurred, "It's a fun hobby and it's still alive and well."

Status update on the OVH 440 MHz D-Star Repeater

The implementation of the new OVH 440 MHz D-Star repeater is progressing on schedule and is expected to be fully operational by September. The general OVH membership, especially those not directly involved, may not appreciate fully how many different issues and problems must be addressed and solved to accomplish this. Much of the work leading up to new D-Star repeater actually is going on over the air daily and by work taking place in the homes of dedicated OVH volunteers working on this project.

This may seem indirect but OVH's and its members' long standing and unselfish support of community and public service activities is involved with this D-Star project. Such involvements pay dividends that are hard to measure, but are certainly there; they are responsible for OVH having two prime radio site locations. The one on NOVEC's main communications tower off of Lomond Drive has been used the existing OVH FM VHF and UHF repeaters for many years; the other at the Mt. Pone water tower site near the intersection of Ashton Avenue and Sudley Manor Drive has been the location of the OVH packet site for years too; it is there on that water tower where OVH's new 440 MHz D-Star repeater will be located. These excellent locations which would be costly as commercial sites have been made available to the OVH gratis because of OVH's community and public service operations. So my hat goes off to all of those club members keeping amateur radio and OVH as one of the organizations worthy of this generosity.

Now for an update on the current status of the 440 D-Star repeater project: OVH has acquired all major pieces of equipment and the equipment is being configured. Some hardware construction and some software configuration is still on-going. Tasks still being worked on and the leads on each include:

- Power source and harness - Karl . W4KRL
- Coordination with the county water authority - George / K4GVT
- Packet system reorganization - Bill / N4SV
- Antenna installation exact date and crew - TBD
- Install DSL for internet access – Keith / KM4AA working on with Verizon
- Install network linking to NOVEC exact date and crew - TBD
- Finalize configuration of D-Star equipment and install - TBD

These are the major steps still to be undertaken, but work is progressing nicely and we expect to meet our deadlines for a fully working and functional 440 MHz D Star repeater in September.

Not mentioned here yet, but again, a special thanks to Mark / WA4KFZ for getting us moving on this project and enable the club to move forward on it. Also special thanks are due to Steve / N4OGR for providing a professional ventilation system which will keep the equipment cool once installed. Last but not least, a special thanks to David / KG4GIY for technical help with the black art of gateway hardware and software configuration.

We confessed... Al thought it was funny as all heck but poor Doris did not see the humor...


Al pointed out to us that we were now subject to a super prank so he could get even... Sam and I lived in fear for what might happen during the next 3 years until we both moved out of the area.


