- 1. Interested in Telephones and Telephone Technology? Now there is a Telephone Museum just west of Boston and well inside the Route 128 Beltway: http://telephone-museum.org Visit this on your next trip to Boston.
- 2. Some "telephone" recollections by Bill / N4SV which led to his interests in electronics and ham radio:
- "As a personal note, I worked for "The Telephone Company" for about 30 years until the lines between telephones and data networks got so blurred that they almost became synonymous and I moved seamlessly into IT work, but still have a hand in maintaining phones. The story I am about to relate was the impetus for me getting into the Telephony business.

"When I was a kid in California we were on a party line, we knew we were on a Party Line because it wasn't uncommon to pick up the phone to make a call and someone was already talking. We became friends with most of those on our Party Line, and we would all respect each others privacy and hang up immediately. Since there was no way to know when they were finished with their call we would just have to check back from time to time to see if they were done. Anyway, that's not the story.

"Back then it was "illegal" to possess a telephone that was not provided to you by The Phone Company (just imagine that today...illegal to own a phone). Occasionally, at flea markets or swap meets someone would have a telephone for sale, and buying one of them was like some people buy drugs today; you were looking over your shoulder when you handed the guy the money. My dad had a friend who moved his business into a building where the previous tenant had left in a hurry and left behind his phones. Usually The Phone Company would know about these types of situations and send someone out to pick up their equipment, in this case they apparently did not. My dad knew I was interested in electronics so he got one of the phones and gave it to me, with the explicit understanding that I was not to try and hook it up to our phone wiring (in those days phones were hard-wired to the jacks, RJ-11s hadn't been invented yet). So naturally the first thing I did, when he was away on a trip, was hook it up to our phone wiring. I was so proud of myself, picking up the phone receiver and making a call on my bootleg phone. Then my problems began. The phone rang a few times, but it was the only one that did, our other phones did not? Because I understood nothing about electronics then I was baffled. One time I got up the courage to answer that phone when it rang, my curiosity getting the best of me. I envisioned it was The Phone Company Police calling to find out who I was so I could be arrested and thrown in The Phone Company Prison. Turns out that phone rang when one of the folks on our party line got a call (as I discovered later party line phones had different capacitors on the ringers, and a unique frequency of AC ringing voltage would be sent for each house on the party line so only their phone would ring)! Anyway I was ecstatic; I "hacked" The Phone Company and was so proud of myself...until my dad discovered what I had done and made me remove it...my rear end is still sore,

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



Continued from Page 6 - Some Possibly Interesting or Useful Information

"So OK, I couldn't hook it up to the phone lines...hmm, what would happen if I hooked it to the wall outlet. Remember this was before I knew anything about electronics or electricity, it was all the same mystery to me. So I got an old table lamp and cut the AC cord off of it (you all know where this is going), and I hooked it to the wires coming from the phone and plugged it into the wall outlet...nothing happened. I lifted the receiver... nothing happened. I went to dial a number (remember this is a rotary dial phone)...and SOMETHING happened...more smoke, sparks and if I hadn't yanked out the cord from the wall, there would have been fire.

"After my dad replaced the fuse I blew, what remained of the phone went into the trash (in a brown bag so no one would know what it was)...my rear end is still sore. Anyway, both experiences with that phone made me want to understand how phones really worked and 15 or so years later I was working for The Phone Company.

"I don't work for The Phone Company anymore but I still work on phones, doing a daily stint as part of my IT work administering, installing and maintaining VoIP phones. Oh and yes, when I discovered that this VoIP technology was being ported to Ham Radio use, the excitement I had as a kid with that first bootleg phone was re-kindled once again. Guess I was born a Geek and will probably go out that way...and what a way to go,".

3. Some similar "telephone" recollections by Paul / W4ZB:

"When I was a young kid in Woodbury, New Jersey (near Philadelphia), we had a non-dial telephone in our home - when you just picked up the handset (no need to turn any crank), a live operator came on after a few moments and ask: "Number please?" - You provided the name or the number and the operator completed the connection and then got off the line. During one stage as young kids, my brother and I would pick up the telephone to just hear "Number Please!" and then hang up without saying anything. Of course the operator knew the number of the telephone that was doing that - and eventually she called and reached our mother - who warned us sternly not to do that again. We didn't.

"My father's mother lived in a very small village (Good Spring) in Pennsylvania where the entire village had just one or may be two party lines. Of course, everyone knew everyone and everyone else's business too; my grandmother and her sister ran the village post office, saw all of the incoming and outgoing mail which had to be left off or picked up at the "post office" where they also operated a small general store for essentials out of a single room in their house. The telephone had a hand crank on it and you had to crank to get the live operator to come on once you picked up the handset; the live operator would then place the call. If the line was already in use by someone else, you had to wait. The telephones there were still party line into the 1980's.

"In the early 1970's I was in a office in DC, and a very senior guy (G. Kibby Munson) in the next office to mine was then in his late-80s but still very, very sharp and detail oriented, with excellent recollection of everything from the mid-1930s back to his childhood in Rochester, New York. If started, he could and would talk at length and in detail about the 1890s, pre-WWI, WWI and the 1920s as though those times had just happened. Once he related that as a child, his family had had two separate telephones in their Rochester home even though, way back then, only a very few people had even one telephone. He had a good answer for why: there were two telephone companies in Rochester in the 1890s but they were in competition and refused to interconnect lines or to switch calls between systems. His father was a practicing Medical Doctor who might need to reached at time - so they needed to have to a separate telephone from each telephone company so callers on either system could reach his father directly.

"As a teenager in southwestern Connecticut, we had a rotary dial, single line telephone in our house. There was direct dialing everywhere, except overseas. My father often made overseas calls, but to do so, it was necessary to call the overseas operator first who would set up a call and then call back once overseas cable lines were available. This was long before satellite and fiber optic cables connections. Direct dialing overseas is almost universal now, but when I got my first office telephone lines in DC in the early 1980's, we needed had to get a different exchange for our fax because the 202-467 exchange did not support direct overseas dialing. For the past 10 years, however, those voice and fax numbers have been operating on VOIP - still another technology - and they are now answered at offices in my home in Catharpin - but could also be answered anywhere else in the world with a good Internet connection simply by moving the VOIP modems there. Communications technologies are constantly changing and improving."
