Minutes of the Ole Virginia Hams Amateur Radio Club Meeting held online on October 19, 2021:

OVH President, Jay / NQ4T, called the meeting to order at 7:30 pm on October 19, 2021 in the training room at the Buckhall Volunteer Fire Department Station. After the Pledge of Allegiance, all present stated their names and callsigns.

Ken / KE2N gave a presentation on measuring RF forward and reverse power. He covered coupling, measurement and the math behind various methods. The power point slides were well prepared. In addition, Ken had many hardware examples on display and he passed many of those around the room after explaining them.

The minutes of the September OVH meeting were approved.

Don WA2SWX gave the Treasurer's report which was duly approved.

Two OVH Member Silent Keys WA1FFX and WA4AVUto report

Charles Michael Murphy "Charlie" a Retired Telecommunications Officer for the U.S. Department of State and know to OVH members as Charlie / WA1FFX, died

peacefully surrounded by family on October 23, 2021 at Prince William Hospital in Manassas at the age of 82. Charlie is survived by his Loving wife Claire of 61 years, three sons, two brothers, six grandchildren, and five great grandchildren. Charlie was born in Boston, Massachusetts where he graduated from Arlington High school in 1957 and joined the United States Air Force. After the Air Force, Charlie worked for the U.S. State Department for 33 years and was stationed with Claire all over the world. Eventually, they settled with their three boys in Manassas in 1979. Charlie was an accomplished Amateur Radio operator, often building his own rigs and electronic devices that would occupy various rooms of the house. He took his rigs to his many tours overseas and enjoyed collecting QSL cards from other "Hams" from all over the world. Tinkering with anything electronic was a passion and he once built his own television.



Edgar Maynard Fleming, Jr, known to most as Ed or Maynard and to OVH Members as WD4AVU, died on September 15, 2021 at age 79. He was born in January 1942, son of the late Virginia Pauline Hill Jackson and Edgar Maynard Fleming, Sr. He worked for Coca Cola for 23.5 years and Branch/Rexel Electric for 20 years until retiring in September, 2012. He graduated from High School in Buchanan County, Virginia and acquired his CDL license. He enjoyed Amateur Radio, belonging to the Ole Virginia Hams Amateur Radio Club and having radio fun with close friends Russ, Bob and John. He was preceded in death by his wife Eleanor; he is survived by his two sons and his daughter; two brothers and one sister; three grandchildren and one great grandchild.



Some Possibly Interesting or Useful Information.

Roy Lewellen, W7EL, author of the antenna design software, EZNEC, is retiring at the beginning of 2022; most of his existing software products will then be available "free" but without further maintenance or support. For more information, go to EZNEC.com W7EL's antenna software has been around since the 1990's, constantly being enhanced. A limited, a version of it has been distributed with ARRL Antenna Handbooks for quite a few years now, and it has has used to created radiation and gain diagrams for many ham and other antenna. Roy / W7EL appeared regaularly at the Dayton Hamvention and other hamfests to promote his product and answer questions. EZNEC has provided a relatively easy to use tool to hams to predict radiation patterns from custom antennas.

Jamboree on the Air (JOTA) 2021

On October 16, 2021, a group of OVH members went to Camp Snyder near Haymarket, Virginia to support the local Boy Scout JOTA operation. The OVH club members specifically supporting JOTA were Theresa / KG4TVM; Wayne / N7QLK; Ken / KN4DD; Bruce / KN4GDX; Andrea / KI4SXM; Rob / W4FSK; Mike / KO4BCN; Don / WA2SWX, John / KG4NXT and Ron / K3FR. Although not physically present, we heard club member Bill / AF4LL talking to Scouts on 2 meter FM.

We had a wide variety of stations at Camp Snyder. Don had DStar. Ken ran 2 meter FM. Bruce had a digital voice station. John ran FT8.

We did not have as many Boy Scouts as usual. Likely COVID related concerns kept them home. The setup could have accommodated many more than showed up. .

Threasa cooked a lunch and had snacks for the OVH members at the event.

We started with good weather but a storm front was approaching around noon and we secured at that time.



June VHF Contests – Two OVH Winners – Compare & Contrast By Ken (aka The Other Ken) / KN4DD, OVH VP (also posted at w4ovh.net)

This last June 12th thru 14th saw the ARRL June VHF Contests. The North American Contest began at 1800 UTC Saturday and ended 0259 UTC Monday.

The Ole Virginia Hams fielded two of the winners, Gil / KM4OZH and Ron / K3FR.

Both are Amateur Extras and "of a certain age." Both started contesting almost immediately after licensing. While similar in their passions for both amateur radio and contesting, their approach is significantly different.

Ron is well seasoned, having acquired his Novice license in 1959. For this contest he used mostly FT8. By comparison, Gil is a relative newcomer, not getting first licensed just six years ago. Gil used SSB/phone.

Gil / KM4OZH:

Gil, KM4OZH, was first licensed in 2015. And as previously stated, gravitated to contesting shortly thereafter. He really enjoys roving contesting and for proof, one only need to look how his Mercedes is outfitted.

Understandably then, Gil prefers FM & SSB while mobile. And, unlike contesting from a base station, Gil has the added challenges of driving, PTT and logging.

When I asked Gil why he contests, he told me that among other things, he viewed this contest as "practice for the VAQP". When asked what was needed for success in contesting, Gil replied "operator skill, radio & antenna – in equal amounts."

In preparing for the contest, Gil, of course mentioned, "know the rules". But he seemed to put most of his effort into the multiplier lists and their effect on his route planning.

He was dealing with 4 bands with different contest point weights. E.g. 2m & 6m were each one point (@ 150w) and 1.25m & 70cm were two points each (@ 100w) per contact. He wanted to get as many grids as possible too.

He began just 4 minutes after the start of the contest making contacts before starting the road trip. After wearing them out, he began his drive. His route includes stops at Amissville, Louisa, Chester Gap and heading north on Rt 522 towards



McConnell Mountain, before heading back. Aside from the drive itself, you would expect the time consumers would be pulling over in a suitable place, setting up antennas & the switching itself between radios & bands. Gil does not have automatic switching in the car.

Perhaps unexpected would be the "looky-loo" tourists and the occasional law enforcement officers. All of the local LEOs had their curiosity satisfied quickly, but the local citizenry was such a time drain that Gil fashioned a sign explaining what he and his odd-looking car were doing, so as not to take time from contesting.

After all that driving, Gil finally stopped contesting at 10:59 PM on Sunday. I asked him about staying up for all of those hours and he said that he "could go all night on adrenaline and contacts".

He told me he tried to arrange for some club contacts, but was only able to do very few.

I am hopeful that next year, more of the club will turn out to make contact with our contesting club members.

Ron / K3FR:

As mentioned earlier, Ron was first licensed in November of 1959 and began contesting shortly after.

Contesting has changed a lot since 1960 when paper logs and check sheets were the standard until today, where integrated, all digital contesting, is the norm. Now we have single operator, two radio (SO2R - https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Single_operator_two_radios) and single operator, two VFO (SO2V) contesting as well as both assisted/non-assisted classes of participation.

Despite the changes that have occurred, the operator is still the focus and the primary limitation to performance.

Ron has some tips If you are new to contesting or just thinking about getting into it.

Before the contest, Ron suggests everyone prepare for the contest:

1) Know the rules (of this contest), the exchanges, the multiplier lists, the propagation patterns and expectations.

Continuing, Ron says:

2) Know your equipment and software. By that he means to make sure you have the proper devices and software for this specific contest. Then make sure they are well maintained and all up to date. That means firmware as well as software. Remember, your radio has firmware that needs updating also, not just your computer. And have spares, if possible.

Additional tips:

3) Despite what many would say, these are sporting events. So, your physical and mental condition is going to play a big part in how you do. Be well rested, fed, and stay hydrated. Caution, do not overeat and stay away from adult beverages, as both can make you sleepy. Plan your rest periods to fit in with low activity and/or reduced propagation.

Lastly, Ron tells us:

4) You don't need the best equipment to do well. I have always had what would be

considered an average station and antennas. Lately, I use a very compromised indoor station in a very compromised location.

The key then, is in how I use my station. I set realistic goals for myself. For instance, I was working to make 200 contacts in 100 grids for the June 2021 VHF Contest. My actual performance was (raw/final) was 215/191 contacts and 92/88 grids. I consider that I achieved my goals.

Setting goals will do two things: i) it gives you a yardstick by which to measure your performance at any point in the contest; and ii) it defines a pace and schedule for your activity.

Design a band plan to maximize your scoring potential.



Practice sending the exchange when you have spare time (traffic jams).

Have a second receiver monitoring conditions on your next bands.

In closing, why does Ron contest?

"Contesting exercises my ability to communicate under less than optimum conditions. Radio sport expands my operating performance. True confession, I passed the Amateur Extra 20 wpm code test in December 1963, less than two weeks after I had operated in the ARRL CW Sweepstakes contest (it was two weekends then). I am certain that I would not have made it without that recent contest practice.

Finally, contesting is FUN. So, if you aren't a contester, test the waters. If you are already into the action, set up your goals and see what you can really do."
