This is reenactment will take place adjacent to the site where the OVH Field Day activities took place — a bit more exact — in the field between Route 15 and the Field Day Shelter.

Since this is August, a number of heat related illnesses are to be expected. This is especially so because the participants in the reenactment will be wearing woolen clothing. Expected are 5 to 6 hundred "soldiers" and possibly 5 thousand spectators. Two periods of military activity are scheduled -- ll:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. It is estimated that two meter simplex will suffice. Handheld rigs will be a necessity.

Hams will be in the thick of things and have an excellent opportunity to enhance our image. I will be collecting names of those that can help out. Contact me if you wish to take part, or for futher information. Also, see enclosed informative literature regarding the enactment.





Battle of Second Manassas



8th Annual Reenactment and Living History Encampment

Battle of Bristoe Station 1863

In the Autumn of 1863, one year after the Confederate victory at the Battle of Second Manassas, another bloody battle was fought in Prince William County, just 8 miles from Manassas at the railroad crossing at Bristoe Station.

This little known battle occurred just 3 months after the decisive Union victory at the Battle of Gettysburg. General Robert E. Lee's Confederate Army of Northern Virginia and General George Meade's Union Army of the Potomac were jockeying for position to control portions of Northern Virginia and were both forced to detach portions of their forces to help support other military campaigns in Tempessee.

In October 1863, Lee's army began a quick offensive with the objectives of keeping Union forces from sending additional reinforcements to the West and to finally drive the invading Union armies out of Northern Virginia. Meade became aware of Lee's intentions and began moving his army towards the high ground at Centreville. Lee's forces caught up with the tail end of Meade's army at the railroad junction at Bristoe Station.

At 2:30 p.m., on October 14, 1863, Lee's army, under the command of General A. P. Hill, observed a small Union force having a leisurely lunch near the train station. Thinking he had caught the Union column off guard, General Hill quickly hurried two brigades forward to engage the enemy. As Hill's troops prepared for the battle, a column of Union troops,

under the command of Brigadier General Governeus K. Warren, moved into the area and took cover behind a railroad embankment opposite the Confederates. The southern forces noticed the increase in Union activity near the railroad tracks and shifted their attack to engage the enemy head on. The Union forces remained hidden behind the railroad grade until the southern forces approached to within 100 yards of the tracks.

Then all at once the Confederate troops were hit with a murderous blast of musket and artillery fire. Entire sections of the southern battle lines were wiped out, but despite their heavy losses and the heavy fire from the Yankee troops, the Confederate forces continued to advance to within yards of the railroad tracks. Even though the Confederate troops greatly outnumbered their opponents they could not overcome the strength of the Union position behind the railroad grade and were finally forced to withdraw at 3:30 p.m.

In a battle that spanned only one hour, Lee's forces suffered over 1,900 killed, wounded and missing while Warren's troops lost only 550. Lee's attempt to force Meade out of Virginia was over at the Union troops, under the cover darkness, quietly slipped away from Bristoe Station.






