

MANASSAS HAMFEST

Digipeater News

The club Digipeater (Digi) has just been upgraded to the latest release of firmware available from Kantronics. This will allow our digi to do many new things to keep us in touch through packet and trying to keep things simple at the same time. The digi has many call signs that will allow us to access different features. Here is a quick look at what these call signs do:

- **WA4FPM-1** This allows you to use the digi as a repeater for your packets on 145.09.
- WA4FPM-2 This allows you to access the PBBS. This is a small BBS that you can leave messages (mail) for other users to pick-up or read the latest ARRL bulletins posted by N4SN.
- **WA4FPM-3** This allows you to use the digi as a repeater for your packets on 223.40.
- WA4FPM-11 This is the "Gateway" call sign. This allows you to use the digi as a repeater for your packets except it is going to crosslink the 145.09 and 223.40, when you transmit your packet to the digi on 145.09, it will re-transmit your packet out on 223.40.



- This is called the "Alias", it is a shortened version of the call sign. It allows you to do the same thing as using "WA4FPM-1 or -3". This makes it easier to type in the call signs when you have several digipeaters that you are going to go through on the same transmission.
- OVH This is the call sign to access what is called a "Node".

 This will be explained in another newsletter.

The only call signs that you can connect directly to are WA4FPM-2 (PBBS) and OVH (Node), all the others will disconnect you immediately after a short message. In future newsletters I will cover more features that are available in the PBBS and also the Node.

FCC PROPOSES TO EXPAND 6-METER REPEATER SUBBAND:

The FCC has proposed, in Docket 88-527, to expand the 6-meter repeater subband by 1 MHz, to include 51-52 The proposal is in response to two petitions filed by two repeater groups on the West Coast, The Southern California Six Meter Club (SCSMC) and The Southern California Repeater and Remote Base Association (SCRRBA). Both groups requested expansion of the 6-meter repeater subband in order to accommodate a growing number of repeaters in the band. . . . Comments on the proposal are due January 27, 1989, with reply comments due February 28, 1989. (The ARRL Letter, December 31, 1988.)

Effective February 1, 1989, QSL cards bound for overseas will be shipped for \$2.00 per pound. Packages of 10 cards or less will continue to be distributed at the rate of \$1.00.

PICKING UP TACKS, NAILS, METAL:

Everyone knows that the best way to pick up spilled tacks, nails, or small pieces of metal is with a magnet.

The problem is, once they're stuck to the magnet, they have to be pulled off again, which can take as long as it would have taken to pick them up one at a time in the first place.

But if you put the magnet inside a plastic bag, the tacks will be attracted to the magnet through the plastic.



NEXT MEETING:




