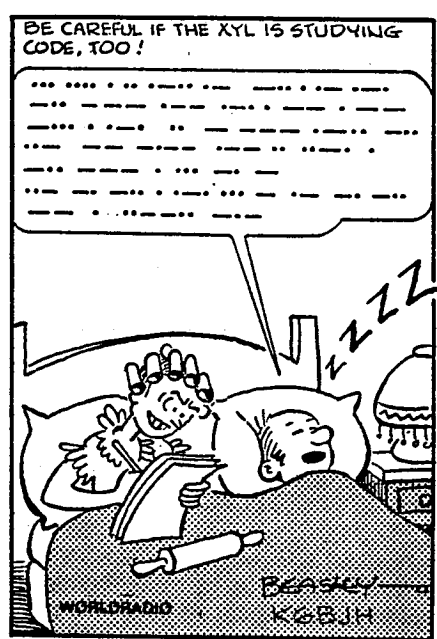

GENERAL INTEREST

EEB Is On The Move:

EEB is moving to 137 Church Street, Vienna, Virginia.

(Go up Mill Street and make a right at the STOP sign. Just three blocks to #137 on the right).

SKYWRN Update:

When development of severe weather appears likely in a given area, the Severe Storms Forecast Center initiates an alert status known as WATCH. A severe Weather WATCH means simply that conditions are favorable for the development of severe thunderstorms and possibly tornadoes.

The WATCH is transmitted to public service and emergency agencies and also the general public by way of NOAA radio, broadcast radio and TV notices.

Should further developments warrant, the regional forecast office will upgrade the alert status to WARNING. WARNINGS are issued only when severe weather activity has actually been confirmed by ground observation.

In this area, SkyWarn activities are based in Camp Springs, MD. Upon receiving a WATCH from the Severe Storms Forecast Center, the duty forecaster begins a Skywarn activation by telephoning one or more amateur operators who are on a Control Operator Standby list and requests that a SkyWarn Radio Net be setup. When the Net Control Operators (NCO) arrive, they are briefed and along with the forecaster, they study radar reports to determine the location of the threatened areas. The forecaster will tell the NCO the type of ground report information he wants and

which areas to check first. Having the forecaster's request in mind and a radar picture, the NCO determines how best to approach the situation, what repeaters to use, etc.

The Skywarn operators are able to establish repeater coverage throughout most of the forecast office area. This area includes the northern third of Virginia, part of the West Virginia panhandle, Washington, DC and the M d. Counties along the Potomac River.

Upon accessing a repeater in a threatened area, the NCO identifies himself and announces that a Skywarn net is being established. If time permits, the NCO will briefly describe the situation and then request reports of severe weather. The NCO should specify the type of observations needed. The NWS forecasters are primarily interested in reports of strong winds, presence and size of hail, rainfall amounts, lightning, direction the storm is moving and, especially, if there is any tornado funnel cloud developments.

Stations responding to requests for ground observations should come back with their call sign only. When recognized, they should indicate their location and describe the weather conditions they are observing. Since time is often critical in Skywarn operations, spotter reports should be clear, concise and as accurate as possible. Wind speed may be estimated, but should be identified as such. If there are no severe conditions observed at the spotters locations, no report should be given unless the NCO asks for reports of general weather conditions.

Once a Skywarn net is established on a repeater, spotter stations are encouraged to remain available until the threat of severe weather has passed. There will be times when

some will wonder why a net has been established, when the only weather conditions they see are sunshine and blue skies. What may not be apparent to those in the field but obvious on the NWS radar screens, is that one or more developing storm cells are headed their way.

After receiving reports from a repeater coverage area, the NCO continues to monitor the frequency or moves to another repeater, depending on the needs of the duty forecaster. Before moving off frequency, the NCO should advise the spotters where he is moving the net or an alternate frequency. In some cases, this will allow ground observers to continue to make reports in case severe weather develops after the net has moved.

During Skywarn, the operative word is often "patience". If there is nothing to report, just monitor the traffic if possible. Your turn will come. If not this time, maybe the next time Skywarn is activated.

NEXT MEETING:



The Field Day Site will be announced at the June Meeting!

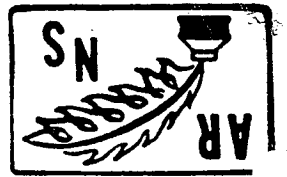

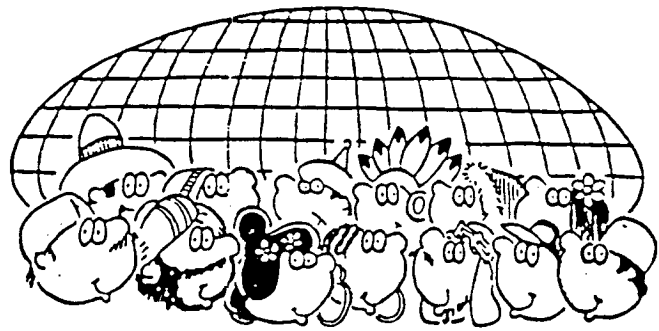
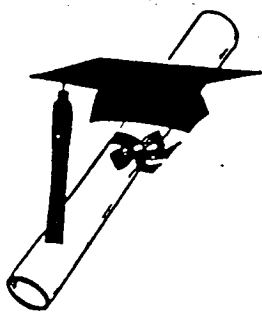
