

The National Traffic System Primer for Packet De NS5N

More and more of us are becoming active in Packet communications and with this activity and interest, belongs traffic handling.

The National Traffic System or NTS began many years ago with the intent to handle just that, national traffic. It has expanded to include international as well. There is a terrific amount of traffic which is being handled on a daily basis which many people are not aware of. I am not saying that we all jump in and start pulling traffic from the net and distributing it, but the development of Packet has made this task extremely easy to

As with any organized system, there are rules to follow. I began by practicing with a friend locally and, fortunately, one which was versed in net procedure and quite forgiving.

Many, if not all of us have been exposed to or at least seen the green and yellow pads with the word "RADICGRAM" emblazoned upon it. With the use of one of many of the aids available, you can successfully complete one of these forms and send a short but informative message to a friend or loved one anywhere (practically) in the Country. However, if you are not familiar with NTS procedures on either the voice or CW nets, you can be a bit intimidated by doing such; and, with some nets, may not be allowed to introduce traffic if you are not a regular.

Enter Packet. All that is required to enter the message into the Packet NTS is the addition of two lines at the beginning, and, of course, be logged on to a mail forwarding system. The latter is easy enough to find out Just enter "LT" and see if there is any "NTS\*\*" responses. This is

not always a sure bet if the board is scarmed by traffic handlers and cleaned out on a regular basis, but it works for most. The former is done by the following:

- 1. ST 2110 @ NTSVA
- 2. QTC Manassas 703/330

In the first line: "ST" (send traffic to) "22110" (the Zip Code area) "@" (at) "NTSVA" National Traffic System Virginia (or whichever NTS traffic system is used for final delivery) (always use the correct two letter state abbreviation).

"OTC Manassas" (the In the second line: city of destination) and "703/330" (the area code and prefix so the message can be forwarded as close as possible for completion by a phone call, if practical.

Then just send the Radiogram as you normally would. Then just send the Radiogram as normal. I lead mine into a file for ASCII transfer.

It doesn't get any easier than that!! So, jump up there and try sending some traffic some time to someone you love!

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Morse Code Requirements:


People with disabilities will get a break on Morse code requirements, the FCC announced June 15. The new procedures will allow volunteer examiners more flexibility in administering exams to handicapped or disabled people. Given a physician's statement attesting to the disability, examiners may be able to substitute a Morse sending test for one in receiving, to allow spoken instead of written copy and to use a Morse code recognition exam. (QST, Aug 1990)

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### Reciprocal Operating Agreement:

The US and Canada share a automatic reciprocal operating agreement making your original FCC license valid in Canada. If you have difficulty getting your equipment through Customs, tell the office r to refer to Memoranda D2-1-1 (p. 7) and D19-4-2 (p. 4). This will remind the officer that you can take your equipment into the country as a part of your personal baggage. You also will need to declare your equipment by completing Customs Form 4457 so you won't have to pay a duty when leaving Canada. (OST, June 1990)

### HARRY'S HAPPENINGS

### July 15th, 1990:

The Prince William Park Authority sponsored a "Summer Sizzler" Bike Tour in which 93 bikers and 6 Hams (including myself) participated. The weather cooperated, no wind and rain only at the end of the ride. There was only one happening of any consequence when a rider broke a casing and had to be transported to the Start/Finish Line.

### Decibels and Repeater Interference:

Historically the Decibel (DB) originated with the Bell Telephone Company. The DB was defined to be the least amount of volume change the human ear could detect. It was found that the mathematical expression "10 times the common logarithm of the ration of the two volumes (powers) that constituted the change" would satisfy the characteristic of the ear. As a formula this is:

10 log<sub>10</sub> P2

Hence the name Deci-Bel (Decibel) -- a contraction of the decimal of the logarithm and Bell (telephone).

In solving the equation for one DB, one discovers that a power change of 1.25:1 is necessary.

In order to make a significant change, one needs a change of say six or ten DB.

A hand held transceiver, operating at onehalf watt, if changed to five watts would represent a ten DB change of power. If a home station were to increase its power from fifty watts to five hundred watts, a ten DB change of power output would be the proper expression.

Now, consider the "S" meter on a HF band receiver and think of the above.

A frequency modulation signal has a peculiarity called "capture effect". With FM, this capture effect causes the stronger of two signals being received simultaneously to "capture" the receiver if the stronger is three to four DB more than the other signal. And, only the stronger signal will be heard. Note: the stronger signal must be two or more times stronger than the weak one as observed at the listening station.

The Ole Virginia Hams two meter and two hundred twenty megacycles repeaters are cross-linked at the audio level. Therefore, no capture effect occurs if the two interfering stations are on these two bands (one on each band). Only audio combining would result. Thus, skip interference on one band can be wiped out by a strong signal on the same band, but if the skip and strong signals are on separate bands, audio interference will result.







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
