#### THERE'S A NEW BUREAU IN TOWN

I saw an interesting advertisement while I was in South America for a new QSL service; so I thought that I would write to them and ask some very specific questions.

Any time a new QSL service becomes available I get a little excited. For the avid radio operator out there chasing DX, it is always good news. What makes this one great news is that it is strictly for U.S. and Canadian QSL cards. That's right! Only cards addressed to U.S. and Canadian amateurs can be sent through this particular bureau. Want to hear some even better new? This particular service is FREE. No, that was not a typo. FREE.....

My obvious questions were instantly penned and sent tot he service for response. Not only did I receive an immediate reply, but am ifying information and a congratulatory for the work I was involved with at the time (but that's another story).

1. Who can use the service?

It is for use by all amateurs worldwide, worldwide, but only cards addressed to USA or Canadian but amateurs are delivered postage free. All cards must be addressed.

2. How do you use this service?

You address 8 or 9 QSL cards at a time and place them in an envelope. This amount of cards still meets the 29 cents postal rate for weight. Stamp the envelope, but not the cards.

Can we send contest QSL cards through the bureau?

At this time, no, but they are gearing up for that part of the service and will notify users when it is available.

That was all of the questions that I had i ially and their flyer answered more that came to mind after the initial letter.

If you are interested in using this service, and would like to make contact with them prior to using them as I did, feel free to drop them a line. They are real friendly and anxious to make this work for all amateurs.

Their address for correspondence is the same as for mailing your QSL cards so hold on to this if you are interested.



#### REPEATER USAGE

I have listed below a few rules regarding repeater usage.

First, some comments regarding the Autopatch:

- 1. Absolutely NO BUSINESS CALLS MAY BE MADE ON THE REPEATER.
- 2. Calls to restaurants, stores, etc., for orders or reservations are also a NO-NO!
- 3. Calls to an employer or on behalf of an employer concerning appointments, schedules (including being late for work) are another NO-NO!
- 4. Calls to avoid telephone calls or calls to tell the telephone company your telephone is not working are more examples of NO-NO's!
- 5. Of course, calls relating to the safety of life and protection of property ARE acceptable. These include reporting of accidents, fires and the like. But, you should STOP and be sure the accident subjects want help -- UNLESS -- traffic is blocked or others are threatened by the situation. In this instance, calling a wrecker to the area is acceptable.
- 6. Another accepted use is personal calls to friends and family!

#### Secondly, dialing 911:

A few incidents have occurred where 911 was called up on the repeater and the caller hung up as the phone started to ring.

It seems that the county emergency dispatcher is equipped with "Caller ID" and after a caller hangs up, the emergency dispatcher is able to identify where the call originated.

Please be advised that one should NEVER dial 911 and then hang up -- the call will be investigated!!!

Thirdly, other comments regarding repeater usage:

- 1. YOU, meaning every ham, <u>MUST</u> comply with FCC regulations at all times. This includes identifying yourself by use of your assigned call sign.
- 2. It is a good idea to check your volume control BEFORE any transmission. (The nature of the squelch controls is such that your volume control might be accidently turned down and you would not be aware of it!)
- 3. It is generally not proper to break into an ongoing conversation unless you have something germane to add, or an urgent time value transmission to make.
- 4. And, please remember, <u>EMERGENCY TRAFFIC</u>
  HAS ABSOLUTE PRIORITY OVER ALL OTHER USE!!!

While this <u>is not</u> all encompassing, it c s give some of the prime items concerning repeater/autopatch use.




