MINUTES OF OVH MEETING DECEMBER 21, 1998

The meeting opened at 8:01 PM with the Pledge of Allegiance, oral roll call, and signing the attendance sheet. The previous minutes and current Treasurer's Report were accepted unanimously. Cathy/AE4UM announced that Keith/KM4AA is the new VE, Jeff/KF4JSV has taken over the Thursday night net, and Larry/KA4CTX is the club EC. Cathy presented Harry/W4PVA with a certificate proclaiming him to be Ham of the Century for all his many years of help and service to the OVH.

NEW BUSINESS

Charlie/WA4YGI reported that classes will begin on January 5, 7-9 PM in room 3A of Stonewall Jackson HS on Rixlew Lane. Refer those interested to Charlie of to Bill/K4WRG.

Harry/W4PVA thanked the members for his certificate. He also mentioned that a former member has lengths of coax and some steel cabinets to give away. If interested, contact Harry.

Cathy mentioned that in the past we donated to the ARRL to protect the ham bands and asked if we should do so again. Bill/N4WJN proposed donating \$150.00, Mary Lu/KB4EFP seconded and the measure passed unanimously.

Charlie/WA4YGI proposed donating \$100.00 to help defray costs of the club web site owner. Bill/N4WJN seconded and it passed unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS

Steve/N4OGR reported that we can send a check to the Red Cross and either leave the distribution to them or specify where it is to be used. He learned from the Red Cross that their greatest immediate need is in Prince William Country after they dealt with a number of house fires and the search after the recent helicopter crash. Jack/N4YIC suggested that any donation be made in person and to invite the local press to cover the event. Steve proposed donating \$150.00 for local use, Bill/K4WRG seconded and the proposal passed unanimously.

PROGRAM

The program had two speakers: NOVEC representative Greg Oberchain and PEPCO employee Mike Martin/K3RWF.

Greg discussed NOVECs "common sense" approach to safety and some causes of interference. He pointed out that many modern items controlled by computer chips with very low power requirements are especially susceptible to any variation from their power needs. Also, that interference can come from non-power sources such as phone lines and cable TV wires. In many cases, grounding the devices is the best solution as long as it is a good ground. He stressed that NOVEC is always willing to help with these matters and to contact them with any requests or questions. Regarding surge protectors, Greg said they have found those with a UL 1449 code to be especially effective. He cautioned against plugging UPSs into surge protectors.

Mike Martin/K3RWF is a PEPCO interference investigator. His vehicle is equipped to detect interference from many sources and on many different frequencies. The truck itself is a diesel to avoid ignition noise. He recounted how finding sources of interference has improved over the years and showed examples of modern day solutions. Mike finds that many times the problems are caused by wooden power poles that shrink as they dry out, leaving gaps between the wood and metal attachments. This can lead to induced voltages that are across the gaps causing noise. The investigators now have devices that can pinpoint the arcing, which is helpful since the gaps can be as small as the width of a piece of paper.

Both presentations were well received and the speakers answered many questions from the members.

Bill/K4WRG won 50-50.

The meeting adjourned at 10:00 PM.

Communications Support for the 53rd Annual Manassas Christmas Parade

(Editor's Note: This was intended for last month's issue. Somehow, it slipped through the "cracks")

Erv Whalen/KT4DS, took charge of developing support for the event this year. Going down to the wire, we ended up with a fully staffed event. For those of us opposed to the concept of "winter equals cold," Mother Nature cooperated by providing a light rain before the parade to provide a little humidity and almost perfect temperatures throughout the event. Almost all of the 116 final entries were present. A few last minute cancellations did not mar the overall effect: the parade kicked off on schedule at 1030 EST on 05 December 1998. Three hours and fourteen minutes later, Santa Claus crossed the finish line.

The weather was nice and no serious incidents were reported. Three minor incidents of candy being thrown from moving vehicles were reported to parade officials (two of the entrants were cautioned directly). Although it seemed almost as though a "ho-hum-gee-whiz" atmosphere developed, only one serious accident or incident would have placed a totally different frame around the otherwise peaceful picture. We were in the right place at the right time and we were ready.

We used tactical call signs this year, and should continue to practice this mode of identification. It's a lot easier to remember a place or entity, rather than who might be staffing a particular location. With a collinear vertical 2 meter whip at NCS, hand-held communications from the judges stand was a little "scratchy" sometimes, the other checkpoints came in fine (mostly mobile rigs, also). So, perhaps next year we could try a mast mounted vertical; just a thought.

As in the past, we started coordinating net set-up on 146.97 MHz through the OVHARC W4CVH repeater. Then we shifted to 146.475 MHz simplex just prior to parade start up. NCS monitored 146.475 MHz simplex, 146.97 MHz repeat and maintained a cellular telephone for back up.

Ruth/KU4WH and Jay/NS5N covered the parade marshalling area and "kept track" of Ricky Ratcliffe, the Parade's "Commanding General." David/KD4DEE and Brian/KE4GKH provided back up at the NCS and staging area after we were told that parade communications were available in the Police Chief's vehicle.

The checkpoints were staffed by: Lisa/KF4FJD and Ellie/KF4NBO; Jeff/KF4JSV and Frank/K3TRM; Matt/KC4ZPM and Doc/W1IMX; Mary Lu/KB4EFP and Butch/W4HJL; Bob/KF4FJE and Harry/W4PVA; and Erv/KT4DS and Cathy/AE4UM. Charlie/ WA4YGI and Art/KW4AW were at NCS.

Thanks to all who supported this exercise. All participants are invited to provide comments to Erv or Art regarding ways we could improve this function or use it more fully for emergency training.
